Description of task	Students plan and organise a safe and enjoyable 18 <sup>th</sup> birthday party	
Type of assessment	Summative	
Purpose of assessment	<ul> <li>To raise awareness of the consequences associated with drinking</li> <li>To raise awareness of the situations and external influences which increase the risk of harmful consequences related to alcohol use</li> <li>To plan for the safety of guests before, during and after the party, while considering legal requirements and host responsibilities</li> <li>To focus on the impact of external influences on the ability of adolescents to make healthy and safe choices</li> <li>To develop skills to deal with challenging or unsafe situations, such as:         <ul> <li>decision making</li> <li>initiating contingency plans</li> <li>assertiveness and refusal skills</li> <li>responding to emergency situations</li> <li>promoting safe practices</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Task preparation		
Prior learning	Students have prior knowledge of the following understandings and strategies: why young people choose to use or not use drugs; how to cope with situations where they may be exposed to challenging environments; the need to make appropriate and safe decisions within various scenarios.	
Assessment differentiation	Teachers should differentiate their teaching and assessment to meet the specific learning needs of their students, based on their level of readiness to learn and their need to be challenged.  Where appropriate, teachers may either scaffold or extend the scope of the assessment

#### Instructions to students

# Hosting an 18th birthday party

Your task is to plan an 18<sup>th</sup> birthday party. Investigate the requirements for hosting a fun, safe and successful event that caters for both over 18 and under 18-year-old guests. Consider the following:

#### 1. As the host:

Describe your responsibilities and how to carry out the role before, during and after the party.

- Examples: invitation, food, drinks, entertainment, provide a safe environment
- 2. As a guest (under 18 and over 18-year-olds):

Describe the responsibilities of guests before, during and after the party.

• Examples: personal and social responsibility for attendance

## 3. Potential party issues:

For each area below, identify and describe how you could minimise the risk of any problems which may occur before, during or after the party:

- alcohol and/or other drug use
- alcohol and driving
- alcohol and sex
- crowd control
- neighbours
- violence.

## 4. Polydrug use

- Define the term 'polydrug use'.
- Identify **two** situations that may arise during the party and describe how you should respond in each.

Produce your information in a form that has been discussed with your teacher.

Formats include, but are not limited to:

- pamphlet
- fact sheet
- poster
- slideshow
- written report
- oral presentation.

Question 1: Role of the host (6 marks)			
Provides comprehensive and detailed description of responsibilities of host and how to carry out the role before, during and after the party; consideration is given to all aspects of party planning.	5–6		
Provides mostly relevant and appropriate description, and includes most of the significant detail; consideration is given to most of the aspects of party planning. Brief and/or limited investigation into the responsibilities of hosting a party.	3–4		
Provides minimal detail; consideration is given to only the basic aspects of party planning.	1–2

Question 2: Role of the guests (4 marks)			
Provides comprehensive, detailed and accurate description; includes thorough description of responsibilities of guests and how to carry out the role before, during and after the party; consideration is given to both groups (over and under 18-year-olds).	3–4		
Provides mostly relevant and appropriate description and includes most of the significant detail; consideration is not given to both groups (over and under 18-year-olds).	1–2
