The Disability Discrimination Act 2005 require educational institutions to provide students with disabilities with the same opportunities as students without disabilities.

Many students with disabilities have strengths commensurate with the way in which they learn and their learning.

In some cases, curriculum opportunities for students with disabilities along the Pre-primary to Year 12 Australian Curriculum may not fully address the learning capabilities and learning needs of students with disabilities to adjust

Adjustments to the curriculum to ensure some students achieve on the same level as others. Adjustments to assessment to ensure achievement and learning are measured fairly.

English as an additional language

Students for whom English is a second language. Western Australian curriculum includes English as an additional language learning, which is designed to support students who are learning English. While most students have strong numeracy) skills in their first language, there are a number of students who are learning English, and have limited English skills.

While the aims of the curriculum are the same for all students, EAL/D students may require additional support to learn the new language and to achieve the same level of learning as other students may require. The curriculum addresses their language needs and provides additional time and support in formal settings.
